- CAN YOU HEAR IT TOO?

"Let me tell you what God said next. He said, "You're my son, And today is your birthday. What do you want? Name it: Nations as a present? Continents as a prize? You can command them all to dance for you, Or throw them out with great force." - Psalm 2:7-9 (MSG)

June has been a month of Supernatural Celebration – a radical season of unbridled praise and rejoicing in who we are in Christ and in the face of all God has done for us. When the Lord calls us into celebration it is a sign that our victory has been concluded. It means that everything we have long desired is not only coming to fruition but coming to fruition speedily. Some of us have had it good and hope for still greater manifestations. And sometimes amidst it all we forget who we truly are and everything we have available to us as joint heirs with Christ. Not just any kind of celebration. But supernatural celebration. One that originates from a full recognition of our birthright, resulting in praise and gratitude; and one that manifests as a complete demonstration of our faith, shifting our focus away from life's challenges to God's greatness, sovereignty, and promise. But our rejoicing is not only a function of praise. It is also an instrument of warfare, akin to Jehoshaphat facing five invading armies, totally outnumbered, and outmaneuvering them with the most unusual of weapons – singing and rejoicing (2 Chronicles 20).

Consider the citizens of Feldkirch, Austria, who found themselves in a similar situation. Napoleon was sweeping across Europe at the time. City after city, country after country, his army was unstoppable. By March 1799, 18,000 French soldiers were at the Austrian border and could be spotted on the heights above the little town, their weapons glittering in the sun. The village didn't stand a chance. A council of citizens was hastily summoned to decide whether they should try to defend themselves or display the white flag of surrender. It happened to be Easter Sunday, and the people had gathered at the local St. Stephen's Church. After tumultuous deliberations, the dean of the church rose and said, "Friends, we have been counting on our own strength, and apparently that has failed. As this is the day of our Lord's resurrection, let us just ring the bells, have our services as usual, and leave the matter in His hands. We know only our weakness, and not the power of God to defend us." The council accepted his plan and the church bells rang out in praise. The enemy, hearing the sudden peal of the bells and the raised voices of the people, concluded that the Austrian army had arrived during the night to defend the town. Before the service ended, Napoleon's commanding officer ordered his army to move on and the enemy broke camp and left.

This season of your life must be very confusing for every problem confronting you because you have responded with joyous celebration where you have been expected to cower in panic. The result can only be victory. There is a shift in the atmosphere, and I trust you sense it too. The message translation of our theme scripture perfectly captures what is happening. God is saying to us, you are my heir, today is your birthday, what do you want? How audacious is your ask? The One who is able to do exceedingly, abundantly above all you can imagine is offering you a blank cheque. This is not the time to be skittish or to shrink back in doubt, guilt or unworthiness. It is the time to step into your identity as a child of God and joint heir with Christ; the time to step into the fullness of your inheritance.
