

BY IGHT GOL. YOU CAN!

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We've been on quite a journey these past few months, haven't we? January revealed God's Overflowing Promises, February showed us His guarantee through the Holy Spirit, and March called us to advance with bold faith. Now, as we step into April, God is elevating our vision even further – from merely moving forward to performing Divine Exploits that break through every barrier.

Exploits are bold, daring feats that accomplish something remarkable. When we pair this with the divine, we are talking about supernatural achievements that can only be explained by God's power working through yielded vessels.

Imagine running against a troop, leaping over walls, and pursuing enemies until they are destroyed. None of these seem possible in the natural. No single person can defeat an army. No human can leap unaided over a fortress wall. But David declares with confidence, By my God I can...

By my God! This is the difference between human striving and divine enabling. It is what transforms ordinary actions into extraordinary exploits. Notice that David doesn't say God will do it for me while I watch. He says, "I can run against a troop... I can leap over a wall." God doesn't replace our actions; He supernaturally empowers them

Look at the progression in these verses:

- 1. First, God equips you: "He makes my feet like the feet of a deer and sets me on my high places." Before the exploit comes the equipping. Deer's feet are designed for agility, stability, and reaching heights that would be dangerous for other animals. When God calls you to divine exploits, He first transforms your capabilities.
- 2. Then, God trains you: "He teaches my hands to make war so that my arms can bend a bow of bronze." Bronze bows are nearly impossible to bend by human strength alone. Yet David speaks of being divinely trained to do what would normally be beyond human capacity. What "bronze bow" has God been training you to bend?
- 3. Next comes relentless pursuit: "I have pursued my enemies and overtaken them; neither did I turn back again till they were destroyed." Divine exploits require holy persistence. Many of us start well but turn back at the first sign of resistance. God is calling us to pursue until we overtake, to advance until we experience complete victory.
- 4. Finally comes total triumph: "Then I beat them as fine as the dust before the wind... You have made me the head of the nations." Notice how comprehensive this victory is. The opposition isn't just temporarily setback; it's completely overcome. And the result isn't just survival, but elevation to new levels of authority and influence.

What walls are you facing today? What opposing forces seem too numerous to confront? Whatever stands between you and God's purpose for your life, this is your season to perform divine exploits that demolish these barriers once and for all.

"I HAVE PURSUED MY ENEMIES AND OVERTAKEN THEM; NEITHER DID I TURN BACK AGAIN TILL THEY WERE DESTROYED. I HAVE WOUNDED THEM, SO THAT THEY COULD NOT RISE; THEY HAVE FALLEN UNDER MY FEET."

PSALM 18:37-38



But how do we position ourselves for these divine exploits? Three key principles come in handy:

1. Recognize Divine Partnership:
Throughout Psalm 18, David alternates between what God does and what he does in partnership with God. Divine exploits emerge from this sacred collaboration.
Acknowledge both your responsibility to

act and your dependence on God's power.

- 2. Embrace Divine Training: Before David performed exploits, he underwent divine training. Sometimes what you're interpreting as delay is actually God developing your capacity for greater exploits. The resistance you feel today is building strength for tomorrow's breakthrough.
- 3. Maintain Divine Focus: Notice how David remained focused on complete victory: "Neither did I turn back again till they were destroyed." Many of us abandon divine assignments prematurely. We pursue until we get tired, discouraged, or distracted. Divine exploits require sustained focus until the breakthrough is complete.

Throughout history, we see examples of believers who performed divine exploits against impossible odds. Think of Gideon defeating the Midianite army with just 300 men. Consider Elijah outrunning Ahab's chariot. Remember how the early church, despite severe persecution, spread the gospel throughout the known world.

We are entering a season where God will showcase His power through unlikely vessels performing unlikely feats. If March was about moving forward, April is about breaking through, about making quantum leaps that defy natural explanation, about overcoming opposition so thoroughly that you emerge as a leader in areas where you once struggled.

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PSALM 18:37-38

Remember, the same God who strengthened David, who made his feet like deer's feet and taught his hands to war, is your God too. You are positioned, equipped, and trained for divine exploits that will bring glory to His name and advancement to His kingdom.

Expect the extraordinary. Attempt the impossible. By your God, you can!
